CHAIR REPORT

As you can imagine, Wesley has set the bar high for our next Patron. So, our search has begun in earnest. Throughout 2023, Metro Arts remained committed to supporting emerging and established artists across various disciplines. Our diverse program offerings, including performance productions, visual arts exhibitions, workshops, and community engagement activities, received overwhelming support from audiences and participants alike. We supported more than 300 visual artists and performers, welcomed over 45,000 patrons through our doors at West Village and Norman Park, and developed 36 new Australian works.

As Board Chair, I am always so excited for the artists we work with who have their talent and creativity recognised by their peers. Huge congratulations to the artists who won or were shortlisted for Matilda Awards this year. As well as the numerous visual arts alumni artists who have gone on to major exhibitions and commission outcomes, including MAVA Pathfinder artist James Barth being awarded the \$80,000 Copyright Agency Partnerships Commission, in collaboration with the IMA.

While we celebrate our community's achievements, we recognise the challenges that lie ahead. The Board and Leadership team remained very much focussed on our future. The ongoing impacts arising from external factors such as economic fluctuations and an ever-evolving arts landscape in which to exist is not without its challenges to our operations. However, we remain agile and adaptable, leveraging opportunities for growth and innovation. Afterall, we exist to ensure that new art is created today, tomorrow, and beyond.

In conclusion, I extend my heartfelt gratitude to our dedicated team led by Jo and now Gen, my fellow Board members Paul Bowker, Tara Hastings, Trent Wallace, Kylie Lonergan, Natano Fa'anana, Dr Mellissa Naidoo, Peter O'Sullivan, Kim Hughes, and Dr Naomi Blacklock. I thank you all for your wisdom, support, and generosity in giving of your time and expertise.

Thanks also to our incredible volunteers, audience members, and supporters for your unwavering commitment and invaluable contributions to Metro Arts. Together, we have made remarkable strides in advancing our mission. You made art start here.

As we look ahead to the future, I am confident that Metro Arts will continue to thrive and make a positive impact on the lives of artists, audiences, and our communities through the transformative power of the arts.

EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR REPORT

Genevieve Trace

This 2023 report marks my first as Executive Director of Metro Arts. 2023 represented a year of significant achievement for the organisation, as well as significant change as we bid farewell to our former CEO and Artistic Director of over eight years, Jo Thomas. In light of this, I wish to thank Jo for her years of dedication to Metro Arts – having championed and hailed in the most remarkable changes to our structure and operations in our 40+ year history. Further, I personally wish to thank her for support and mentorship as I worked up through the ranks of Metro Arts to my current position. It is off the back of Jo's vision and work that the following achievements were made possible.

For Metro Arts, our values are at the core of all we do. Simply put these values are as such:

- We value the artist's voice and vision.
- We value creative rigour and risk.
- We value agency and sustainability.

Central to this is the artist. This is the point of difference that goes to the very structure of Metro Arts as an organisation. The idea of direction for Metro Arts is less about being dictatorial, and more about listening to community. Sure, executive decision are required to be made drawing from administrative experience – but this experience should not dictate the future only inform it.

In stepping into the role, I have been reflecting on those who have come before. In looking at the original Articles of Association for the Brisbane Community Arts Centre (now Metro Arts), I had to smile. If ever there were a through line of commitment to the artistic sector and its development it would be from the original objects for which the organisation was established through to our current Strategic Plan. The 1979 document outlines our commitment to provide resources, equipment, space, administrative assistance, and training. This commitment still stands in our programs today. Further to this, the document outlined a commitment to 'foster innovation' and the experience of 'a diverse range of cultural activities' for the general public. These commitments made 43 years ago, proudly stood in our 2023 program evidenced in the following examples:

- The world premieres of Hold Me Closer Tony Danza by The Farm and Break by The Farm and Cecilia Martin: Two works showcasing The Farm's distinct style of physical storytelling traversing both the playful and popularist, to the personal and intimate;
- The Brisbane return season of Betwixt by Pink Matter after having won the Bank SA Best Dance Award for Adelaide Fringe in 2023;
- The world premiere of SHE by indelabilityarts in collaboration with Pip Theatre and The Good Room: Where stories of women's mental health from the public were woven with key texts from writers Bianca Saez, Karen Lee Roberts, and Nici Morey to create a poignant reminder that we have much to learn in truly recognising and understanding the multiplicity of experiences with mental health;
- The group exhibition Precision: The Art of Cutting, curated by Stephanie Linquist with Minqi Gu, presented as part of Brisbane Art Design (BAD) with the Museum of Brisbane: Featuring such artists as Brian Robinson, Pamela See (Xue Mei-Ling) and Henri Van Noordenburg, the exhibition looked at the shifting practice of paper cutting as medium from its traditional roots across cultures to the extension of the practice into contemporary cross-media realms;
- The world premiere of *ITEM* by Dance Masala (Nakhre Crew): Presented after undertaking the Creative Development Program in 2022, *ITEM* was both a love letter and cease and desist letter to Bollywood. Earning a nomination for Best Independent Production at the Matilda Awards and a sellout season, the work drew on the personal perspectives of the *ITEM* ensemble, presenting a mixture of the joys and hazards



of Bollywood analysed through a relational lens where a lover can quickly turn into a problematic ex.;

- Our partnership with Brisbane Festival: Which saw the presentation of Patterns for Future Living by Rae Haynes, On Heat by Leah Shelton, Personal by Jodee Mundy Collaborations in partnership with Critical Stages Touring, Kuramanunya by Karul Projects, and Party Ghost by Double Take in partnership with Cluster Arts;
- Every Brilliant Thing (written by Duncan Macmillan with Jonny Donahoe) co-presented by THAT Production Company: Which saw the mentor-mentee relationship flip as long-time mentee Timothy Wynn directed long-time mentor Jason Klarwein in a beautiful poignant version of the script – earning the production two Matilda Awards for Best Performance in a Leading Role Independent Production (Jason Klarwein), and Best Independent Production; and
- The group exhibition Torsion curated by Kyle Weise: A culmination of new and existing work from local and international artists pulling apart notions of consumerism, capitalism and branding with the humble, but identity-laden and social strata-imbued, sneaker as a curatorial lens.

As always, the public program at Metro Arts represents only a fraction of the work the organisation does in its bespoke support of artists and arts companies. A key example of this is our Residency Programs. 2023 saw Metro Arts continue our support of Counterpilot as Company in Residence and we welcomed Joshua Taliani as Artist in Residence. Both programs have seen Metro Arts tailor support to the needs and objectives of the artists, supporting them in creative development of new works, producing and touring support, industry network development, and, in the case of Counterpilot, bespoke support in establishing business and governance practices that confer their position as an independent company with a suite of works ready for market.

Additionally, the MAVA Pathfinders program culminated in June with an exhibition, MAVA Pathfinders: Artefacts of the Working Process, showcasing the concepts and key learnings from participant artists James Barth, Caitlin Franzmann, and Liz Willing. The MAVA Pathfinders program again saw business and entrepreneurial training specific to mid-career visual artists across the 12-month program. Funded by the RISE Funds, we thank the federal Department of Infrastructure, Regional Development, Communications and the Arts; and further this thanks to UAP as Industry Partner.

As we look forward to the future, I again want to reflect on a section of the original Articles of Association for the Company. This section states an object of the Company is, '[t]o act as an entrepreneur and initiator in activities of a cultural nature and in particular to encourage the development of those activities in the community.'

With time, comes growth. Metro Arts has championed the professionalisation of the independent art sector over its esteemed history. As we continue to grow and learn, there will always be opportunities for Metro Arts to honour our original incarnation.

We exist so artists continue to grow as independent professionals. So, watch this space as Metro Arts continues to cement itself as a leader in the innovative thinking and strategic partnership development for projects and programs where the artist's voice, vision, rigour, risk, agency, and sustainability guides and informs us.

TREASURY REPORT

Paul Bowker, Board Treasurer

In 2023, Metro Arts was able to deliver a full program of events, without any residual impacts from COVID related interruptions. This presented a significant relief and a tremendous opportunity for a return to deep engagement between the business, the artistic community and the broader community of art supporters.

The core focus of the business throughout 2023 was ensuring that all of its assets, including the theatre space, exhibition spaces and creative rooms were fully utilised. With many performances and exhibitions being interrupted over the past few years due to COVID, it was pleasing to see such a full program of activity in 2023.

The impact of a return to full programming saw Revenue increase to \$273,000 in 2023, up from \$232,000 in 2022. The increase was largely a result of an increase in the number of performances, but also a continuing increase in the engagement with the arts loving patrons resulting in an increase in ticket sales per performance. With an exciting program locked in for 2024, we are looking forward to similarly strong attendance support from our existing and new visitors to Metro Arts' performances and exhibitions.

The operating expenses (excluding employee expenses) of the business increased to \$807,000 in 2023, up from \$701,000 in 2022. This increase of 15% in operating expenses was less than the increase in revenue, reflecting a tight management of the cost base by the Metro Arts Management Team. The other key overhead to running the business are employee costs, which were \$1,076,000 in 2023, down from \$1,150,000 in 2022. It is a credit to the Management Team that an increased program and increased revenue was delivered in 2023, with reduced staffing.

The operating business is supported by the Metro Arts Future Fund ("**MAFF**"), the performance of which is set out below. The operating business as a standalone, incurred a loss of \$639,000 in 2023. Despite the increase in revenue and the tight management of the cost base of the business, there is clearly more work to do to ensure a long-term sustainable business. One of the key issues facing the business and the creative sector more broadly, is the reduced support being received from the State and Federal Governments. Metro Arts has been on the front foot, both privately and publicly, to campaign for support for our sector.

One of the key issues facing the business and the creative sector more broadly, is meeting the challenges of the current economic landscape, which, in turn, sees more competition for State and Federal Government funding. Metro Arts has been on the front foot, both privately and publicly, to campaign for support for our sector.

Noting this competition, in spite of rising costs of production, Metro Arts has needed to rely heavily on the MAFF, which delivered a positive return of \$432,000. When added to the operating loss, the overall loss for 2023 was \$207,027. As noted, Metro Arts has, as a core pillar of its strategy, the goal to ensure the long-term sustainability of the business. With significantly reduced support through government grants likely into the future, Metro Arts has had to continue to ensure that its cost base reflects both income and future government grants. The outcome of this into the future is that Metro Arts will continue to tightly manage and reduce overheads, and also, unfortunately, be forced into looking to moderate some of its arts programming and other support mechanisms for the arts community.

We will continue to closely monitor the delivery of the program and resources required and where there is a business case to increase investment in resources, the Board will assess these opportunities.

Metro Arts also saw the departure of our CEO and Artistic Director, Jo Thomas. Jo has been a key driving force behind all that is great in Metro Arts for over eight years and her presence will be greatly missed by our community. Metro Arts was however in the fortunate position of having its General Manager Genevieve Trace agree to step into a leadership role as Executive Director. The Board and Genevieve have been working closely together for several years, and the Board looks forward to supporting Gen as she leads Metro Arts into its next phase of growth.

On behalf of the Board, we would like to thank all those in our community that have participated in delivering a quality and innovative arts program. We have an incredibly exciting future and look forward to spending more time with artists, our donors, supporters, the wider community and of course the hard-working Metro Arts team that makes it all possible.

Metro Arts Future Fund (MAFF)

In 2023, the MAFF delivered a positive return of \$432,000, inclusive of its income stream and capital growth components. As at 31 December 2023, the MAFF had a balance of \$6,054,000, which was in line with the 31 December 2022 balance of \$6,071,000.

The capital balance of the MAFF finished 2023 where it started, with the positive return of \$432,000 being used to fund the business' operational loss.

Although the return on the MAFF was positive, the portfolio allocation did result in reduced returns compared to some benchmarks. The current investment allocation of the MAFF has an Environmental, Social and Governance ("**ESG**") overlay that significantly reduces the asset classes available for investment. Metro Arts is working closely with its investment manager, Perpetual, to ensure that an appropriate balance between investment outcomes and ESG philosophy is implemented to ensure the long-term security of the MAFF and the Matro Arts humans.

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DEVELOPMENT REPORT

2023 saw Metro Arts strengthen ties with its donor and sponsor communities. The year saw donor engagement increase as the organisation welcomed over 217 new donors.

This increase to our community of donors is heartening and deeply felt by Metro Arts. As the current cost of living pressures escalate, we are acutely aware of this burden on our donors and community. Considering this, we are deeply grateful that donors continue to support the mission and objectives of Metro Arts throughout this time. Central to this are our ArtStarter and ARTrepreneur donors, who year after year continue their support of independent artists and their stories. These central groups are the heart of our philanthropic community, and we love any opportunity to welcome them to the venue and for them to have a dialogue with the artists they support.

Bolstering the increase in community giving are significant gifts from major donors Mrs Gina Fairfax AC and Mr Tim Fairfax AC. Such is the continued support from Mrs and Mr Fairfax that we hold them dear to our heart in what we term the *Inner Circle*. On behalf of the hundreds of artists who have directly benefited from their support, we thank Tim and Gina for their continued and holistic support of the arts ecology, specifically in Queensland.

2023 also saw Wesley Enoch AM step down from his role as Patron of Metro Arts as he stepped into his new role as Deputy Chair of Creative Australia. Metro Arts wishes to thank Wesley for his tireless support of the organisation during his 5-year tenure as Patron, including his generosity in supporting many a fundraising campaign during this time.

The year also saw Metro Arts welcome the Dalwood-Wylie Foundation as a Strategic Partner. The Foundation provided cash support to purchase several large technical items specific to the Galleries and New Benner Theatre. Artists across the 2023 program benefited from these acquisitions, as our artistic community continues to push the boundaries of technical manipulation in art.

Further to this, Metro Arts also received support through Perpetual's IMPACT Philanthropy Application Program allowing the organisation to deliver a suite of education and public programming activities supporting our annual program over the course of 2023 and 2024.

In 2023 we welcomed two key Sponsors to our Sponsorship family. Leading digital and design agency yomconnect joined with Metro Arts to deliver key digital marketing support for the organisation's growing annual program. And Hare and Forbes Machineryhouse joined to help fit out the MAVA Workshop with industry specialist tools for the benefit of the artistic and local community alike. These sponsorships represent real budget relieving value, that allow Metro Arts to reach more people in the community than originally possible. yomconnect and Hare and Forbes Machineryhouse joined the likes of West Village, UAP, Brick Lane Brewing Company, Tonepacer, Dendy, Bones Accounting, Oatley Wines, Heritage Conveyancing, and Specfurn Commercial Furniture. Metro Arts is extremely grateful for the support of its Sponsors and we have enjoyed welcoming representatives from each organisation to the venue across the 2023 period.



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
