



CHAIR REPORT

If ever the time was right for us to find ourselves and lose ourselves in art, it is now. 2021 – 2022 turned out to be quite the roller-coaster for us here at Metro Arts and the world more broadly. However, I can assure you that your Board and management team of Metro Arts remained true to the vision, mission and values. Art did indeed start here.

It is with a mixture of excitement and disbelief that I present my first annual Chair's message and Metro Arts' Annual Report. Excitement because as you read through this report, you will see just how successfully the Board and team at Metro Arts has pivoted, pirouetted, pranced, reimagined and rebounded. I know I speak on behalf of the Board when I say that what the team has achieved in 12 months has been remarkable. None of this would be possible without the formidable leadership of Jo Thomas. Jo's commitment to Metro Arts and artists is never in doubt. Thank you, Jo.

Disbelief because I cannot quite comprehend that it has been 12 months that I have attempted to fill the very big shoes of Michael Cottier, your previous Chair and treasurer. Michael (or Mike as the entire rest of the world knows him) is a generous, quietly-spoken man who gave so much to Metro Arts over many years. His wisdom and talent are missed. However, the show has gone on. In those 12 months, it was my role to ensure that the huge gains made in the past few years by the Board and organisation were not lost. Despite the floods, pandemic and funding challenges. I can assure you we have not lost ground. The MAFF has continued its overall growth; our financials remained dynamic; and philanthropy greatly appreciated. The team has been able to craft a hybrid approach to safely working from home or on site at West Village, all while ensuring that artists and their creations have remained at the heart of what we do.

There were times when we felt lost, most recently during the floods in February 2022. Yet, we found ourselves again mopping up some water damage in our venues, and then doing what we do best: supporting artists and other local companies by assisting in their flood cleanup, or supporting artists to regroup for an opening at a later date.

Over the next 12 months, your Board will focus on continuing to ensure we work towards our four strategic goals: space for artists, audiences, and local communities; pathways for contemporary artists; growth and innovation in artistic ambition; and diversity, underpinned by a strong organisation. To that, the Board is working on ensuring its membership is as diverse as our community by recruiting new members.

Over the coming months, I look forward to being beside you as you lose yourself and find yourself in the brave, contemporary art developed and created by local emerging and mid-career artists. I know it will be bold and inspiring!



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ARTISTIC DIRECTOR & CEO REPORT

Jo Thomas

The last show in our 2021 performance season was a remount of the tremendously funny Leotard which was first presented at the Edward St Metro Arts in our Farewell Festival in February 2020. Created and performed by two fabulous Brisbane artists, Neridah Waters and Bridget Boyle, it was a fitting end to another rollercoaster year for us all. Leotard was a chance to celebrate performance, laugh out loud and remember the joy of play. One scene in this show summed up 2021 for me. In it, Waters as a solo performer re-enacted an acrobatic, dance routine performed by a troupe. As the routine progressed and things started to go awry, character Tracy came to the rescue, catching set pieces, stepping in for injured dancers, reimagining choreography, injecting an epi-pen into a crew member, cleaning up vomit in the audience and yet still managing to deliver the grand finale with an epic costume with flashing lights and wings. After each rescue she'd quietly exclaim.... "Phew. Close one!"

And that was 2021 at Metro Arts– continuing, reinventing, reimaging, cartwheeling, catching, delivering the performances and exhibitions, quietly wiping our brows with a "Phew. Close one!" And onto the next...

Alongside many of our colleagues in the sector we sustained lost income through Covid-19 lockdowns, reduced capacities and rescheduled works but we continued to function at a high level working with 674 artists in 2021. We continued to focus on supporting independent artists in an incredibly difficult time and offering their work to our community when most needed.

The exceptional work of Metro Arts was again honoured this year. Firstly, we were the only Queensland organisation to receive a prestigious Sidney Myer Award for excellence in performing arts. My thanks to Andrew Myer and all at the Sidney Myer Fund for this honour and for their ongoing work recognising and valuing the role art and artists play in affirming identity and community spirit. I also take this opportunity to recognise the work of Sidney Baillieu Myer AC, Co-Founder and Past President of The Myer Foundation, who died early in 2022. The legacy of our great philanthropists, such as Mr Myer, is continuously seen in the development of Australian society and our arts and culture.

Throughout 2021 Metro Arts enjoyed the support of another one of Australia's major philanthropic foundations, the Ian Potter Foundation, for our new two-year pilot program, The Emerging Producer Xchange. The Xchange, in partnership with The Mill in Adelaide, supports the professional development of emerging producers to offer even greater support to independent artists creating new Australian work. Feedback from one of our four emerging producers supported in 2021 shows the foundational benefit of this program. "My local networks have really grown because of the industry contacts I have made through Xchange. When jobs or contracts come up, people

are asking me to apply...artists are also asking if I want to collaborate. Xchange has been super useful." This wonderful program continues into 2022 with a further three emerging producers being employed.

I also had the joy of meeting one of Australia's new arts philanthropists in 2021 when Tim Minchin invited Metro Arts representatives to his Brisbane concert and supported the organisation with a generous donation and shout-out for our work supporting contemporary artists. Tim is a prolific, inspiring artist and his concert was a personal highlight for the year.

The Metro Arts artistic program in 2021 boasted many exceptional exhibitions, performances and micro-festivals including The Mechanics of Adaption Group Exhibition in September as part of the Brisbane Festival. After 10 successful years and four million trips, the Brisbane CityCycle program ended in 2021 so, of course, Metro Arts commissioned local artists to reimagine the retired bikes! Artists Ross Manning, Kinly Grey, Susan Hawkins, Aishla Manning and Sarah Poulgrain, in collaboration with young people through Traction and The Sycamore School, created our highest attended exhibition to date. Our thanks to all partners and especially JCDecaux.

The inaugural Mad Dance Festival, in partnership with Mad Dance House, in May 2021 was a unique celebration of the Queensland street dance scene. This Festival highlighted hard-hitting performances, workshops, developments and a fantastic gathering of community, again showing Metro taking the lead in contemporary artform development. This festival was also an opportunity for our Company-in-Residence Pink Matter to shine. Under the directorship of Wanida Serce, Pink Matter showcases powerful women and diversity on our stages! The Company was a tremendous addition to our 2021 program presenting three finished works across the year and developing numerous others.

As we continue to navigate a rapidly changing world, collaboration and courage are crucial. Our creative collaborators are our incredible artists and community who work with and support Metro Arts. Of the 674 artists profiled in 2021 just over half were new to Metro Arts. This balance of working with the new and our established creatives is a key feature of the career pathways Metro Arts develops and promotes. Our other vital partners and friends in 2021 included 4A Centre for Contemporary Asian Art, BlakDance, Blaklash, Brisbane Festival, Bus Projects, Camerata, MARS Gallery, Museum of Brisbane, Next Wave, Playlab Theatre and QMF. My thanks as always to our Government stakeholders: Brisbane City Council. Arts Queensland and Australia Council for the Arts for support of Metro's annual program delivery.

The Metro Arts team has continued to be exceptional in extraordinary circumstances. My thanks to all of them including our outgoing team members in 2021: Development Consultant Celestine Doyle, Business Director Christine Johnstone and Producer Matt Seery. The biggest of thank yous to our outgoing Board Chair Michael Cottier. Michael has been a tremendous help to me personally and an incredible Chair for the organisation. I thank Dr Fiona Hawthorne for stepping into the role and all of the Board for their tireless work during a tiring 2021. Wipe your brows! More great art to come.





TREASURY REPORT

Paul Bowker and Brian Wyborn (Chair of Investment Committee)

The Metro Arts operations were heavily impacted by the ongoing fallout from the Covid-19 pandemic. However, as Jo mentions in her CEO / Artistic Director Report, your team at Metro Arts was very effective in adapting operations to ensure the safety and support of its staff and stakeholder groups, as well as managing the business in a fiscally responsible manner.

The business overall returned a profit of \$193,636 for 2021, which was an improvement over the loss of \$123,757 in 2020. There were several factors that led to the business being able to navigate the pandemic so successfully, and in particular, I would like to highlight:

- The incredible job Jo and her team did in working tirelessly to ensure that the business remained nimble and adaptable to an operating environment that could often change dramatically on a day's notice, such as was the case with lockdowns and capacity restrictions
- The work of all the Board and Management who came before us in protecting the valuable building asset in Edward Street that was sold in 2020 with the funds forming the Metro Arts Future Fund
- The strong and tight management of the ongoing operational expenses to minimise any negative financial impacts during periods in which the

venues were unable to operate at capacity, or at all; and

• A robust investment philosophy underpinning the Metro Arts Future Fund ("MAFF") that ensured strong returns were achieved throughout 2021.

Metro Arts Future Fund

In a year that saw the continued effects of Covid-19, the investment classes in which the MAFF was deployed faired broadly well through 2021. We have seen unemployment rates fall, global supply chains tighten and inflationary pressures seeping into the market. Mid-year we saw the Delta variant spread, lockdowns being enforced across the globe impacting economies and decimating businesses, not to mention the human toll. Throughout all this, global economies performed well, reopening continued, and market forecasters were surprised on the upside reflecting strong economic fundamentals.

The MAFF was a beneficiary of some of the positive impacts in these markets. As at 1 January 2021, the MAFF Portfolio was valued at \$6,189,833 invested across broadly a 40/60 split of growth vs defensive assets. Throughout 2020, the Board adopted a defensive weighting of the MAFF in response to the volatile markets of 2020 when the MAFF was created. In early 2021, the Board sought to review the strategic asset allocation and increased the allocation to growth assets



in order to reflect the long-term strategy and organisational needs of Metro Arts in supporting artists. Through additional contributions to the MAFF and positive market returns in the portfolio, the MAFF was valued at \$7,338,073 as at 31 December 2021 reflecting a 50/50 growth vs defensive asset allocation. In 2022 we hope to continue our growth trajectory with a keen eye on downside risk management.

Operations

The underlying operations of the business, comprising production and performance fees and royalties, café and bar sales and venue hire, grew to \$318,130 in 2021 up from \$175,008. This was driven partly from the more severe impacts of Covid-19 in 2020, but also a result of the operations now being embedded in the new West End location with a full year of trading having taken place. Subject to any ongoing Covid-19 related restrictions and effects, we would expect some growth in this revenue number in 2022.

The second of the core funding streams for Metro Arts has historically been income derived from government subsidies, grants and donations. In 2021, the business received \$1,207,007 from these sources, appearing to be down from \$1,325,134 in the year prior. Although the figures indicate Metro Arts Annual Report 2021

a slight reduction, income from grants was strong in 2021 with some funds (notably a \$400,000 federal Government RISE grant) held over for expenditure in 2022. The business will continue to focus on ensuring subsidies, grants and donations are an ongoing source of funding as this provides a direct and very important contribution to our artistic community. It is heartening to note the 2021 figures also encompass a significant increase in donations / philanthropy which is a growth area for Metro Arts.

The third key revenue source for the business is the Metro Arts Future Fund, described [above]. This Fund had positive returns of \$656,268 for the year which provides the business with a long-term source of equity and income to underpin the business and allow for long term strategic decision making.

Off the back of strong growth in 2021 of operating revenue, an ongoing valuable contribution from subsidies and grants, as well as a sound strategy to grow the Metro Arts Future Fund, Metro Arts enters 2022 confident and positive that it is on a sure footing to continue to invest in and develop the arts sector, whilst growing its overall balance sheet strength to ensure a longterm sustainable operation.

DEVELOPMENT REPORT

2021 did not represent the reprieve from Covid-19 that many of us hoped for, nevertheless the Development Department worked hard to garner significant support across a body of sponsors, donors and key bodies to allow Metro Arts to navigate through significant hurdles over the course of the year. The following is a snapshot of such support, but we remain greatly appreciative of all who have given and supported the organisation through this time.

2021 saw Mr Tim Fairfax AC and Mrs Gina Fairfax make the first major donation into the Metro Arts Future Fund ('MAFF'). Additionally, Mr and Mrs Fairfax also contributed to the continued creative development of new Australian work across the 2021 period. We thank Mr and Mrs Fairfax for their generous and timely support of both new work for today and the artists of tomorrow. Metro Arts was also fortunate to gain the support of another leading philanthropist in 2021 with Tim Minchin recognising the importance of Metro Arts to the independent arts and wider arts ecology. His donation to the organisation was the proceeds of VIP charity tickets purchased for the Brisbane leg of his BACK tour, and greatly contributed to philanthropic awareness of Metro Arts. The year also saw the Sidney Myer Fund recognise Metro Arts' achievements by awarding the organisation the 2020 Sidney Myer Performing Arts Award for a Group in Queensland. We thank the Fund for their recognition of

independent artists and their importance in a thriving performing arts ecology.

Recognition for the importance of the behind the scenes action at Metro Arts came in the form of funding from Perpetual's IMPACT Philanthropy Application Program, which allowed the organisation to undertake key capacity building work in marketing and digital communications towards audience development. This type of capacity building support is hard to come by, and Metro Arts thanks Perpetual and the Trusts they represent for identifying this need for not-for-profits across the many sectors with which they work. Metro Arts also garnered a significant funding amount from the Australian Government's RISE Fund, which will see the development and implementation of the MAVA Substation and Program at satellite venue, Norman Park, to build the capacity of mid-career visual artists, whilst also fostering the use of workshop space, tools and resources for the wider arts community.

The year also saw the continued rollout of our Education Partnership with TAFE Queensland. 2021 was a momentous year for this Partnership, as Metro Arts made a concerted effort to focus on emerging artists/arts workers as the sector continued to contract under the pressure of the ongoing pandemic. This included the presentation of the Young Artist Forum, the Honours Degree 2021 Exhibition, the Industry of Practice Night and the creative development of Sunny Tribe

District by TAFE alumni company Robert the Cat. Another key facet to the support of emerging artsworkers was the rollout of the inaugural Emerging Producer Xchange made possible with the support of The Ian Potter Foundation.

The year saw our Partnership family continue to grow. Mad Dance House, led by Director Meg Cooper, came on board to partner in the presentation of the inaugural Mad Dance Festival. We thank Meg for partnering with us on this important addition and recognition of Queensland's Street Dance scene. West Village and Hutchinson Builders entered into the second year as Founding Venue Partners having supported the building of Metro Arts' new home in West End in 2020. Bricklane Brewing Co came onboard as a Strategic Partner to support our bar offering, and Heritage Conveyancing joined as key legal support for the organisation. Once again, we would like to thank Bones Accounting for their partial in-kind services and Hall Chadwick for their continued support of Metro Arts.

Metro Arts thanks all our funding stakeholders, donors and sponsors for their continued support during an unprecedented time.

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
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
