CHAIR REPORT

As you will see from this annual report, Metro Arts has been quietly and not so quietly doing its thing. Continuing to offer thought-provoking visual art, dance works that break your heart and lift your soul, performing art that challenges your status quo, your privilege, and your routine.

I'm very proud to say that in the past 12 months the Board has done a lot of work in both Board-facing reviews as well as business-facing work. Thank you to each and every Director for bringing their skills, commitment, insight, and time to Metro Arts. I'm deeply grateful for this and humbled by the acumen that sits around the Board table.

Since January 2023, the Board has met with and appointed 4 new members. It has been my intent to curate a Board that reflects the community we serve. We have recruited two artist representatives who will join us at the AGM. We once again have the privilege of First Nation's wisdom on the Board and our Giving Committee. We will have a full complement of Directors on the Board as we head into the 2023/2024 year.

It has been another 12 months of highs and lows. And as we approach the AGM this year, a time for thank you and see you again soon.

This year sees Daniel McKewen and Bradley Coombs step off the Board.

Dr Daniel McKewen, a Brisbane-based, nationally recognised visual artist and academic. Dan has been with us since 2017 making him the longest serving current Board member. His quiet informed presence on the Board and corporate history of Metro Arts has been valued. Dan's passion for and commitment to the visual arts community, along with a talent for asking just the right question at just the right time have been his strengths on the Board. I knew I could rely on Dan to speak on behalf of the artists he works alongside, and to always ensure the Board held the artist at the heart of what we do. Thank you, Dan. I will miss your dedication to visual arts and our chats as we stroll to our cars after a meeting or performance.

Brad Coombs, a senior executive in the property and business sector, joined Metro Arts in 2019. Brad's sector experience, wisdom and acumen saw him work closely with Jo and her team as we navigated the move from Edward Street to West End. His ability to cut to the heart of what was needed and ask questions forcing us to reflect, and review meant that Board conversations benefited from Brad's presence. Metro Arts as an entity has also benefited greatly from Brad's generosity with his time and skills. His enjoyment at meeting artists, philanthropists, or invited guests has meant that our philanthropic base has grown. Brad has always reiterated his ongoing commitment to Metro Arts. Thank you, Brad. Your passion for Metro Arts and the work we do is so contagious.

Metro Arts, led by Jo Thomas and her team, has continued to make Brisbane and Queensland proud. Nineteen Matilda Award nominations across 12 categories certainly cemented Metro Arts as the champion of independent and emerging artists. From those nominations, six artists supported by Metro Arts won in their category. Congratulations to those winners, and all who were shortlisted.

Brisbane-based collective Pink Matter's work Betwixt took out the BankSA Best Dance Award and Pick of the Week Award as acknowledgment of outstanding events presented within the Adelaide Fringe program, judged by a panel of arts industry leaders and arts lovers. They later performed sell-out shows at Metro Arts.

Metro Arts supports artists every step of the way – from early development of ideas through to presenting and touring work. It is undeniably the incubator and launch-pad for Australian artists. It provides much needed space (physically and figuratively) for Australian artists to grow, create, develop, experience, and carveout a sustainable and viable arts' practice. This is what we have done for over four decades. Metro Arts must not only continue, it must also thrive and grow.

However, we cannot do this without financial support. My heartfelt thanks to our stakeholders, funders, philanthropists, Art Starters, and donors. Every donation counts. Every donation goes towards helping artists find their place in our community. If you can help us by giving regularly or arranging for your workplace to give through payroll giving or other ways, please reach out to us. Buy a drink at the bar and round-up your change. Every little bit allows us to offer more support to artists. Which in turn offers you more art to experience. Because at Metro Arts, this is where the true magic of arts happens.

So, on behalf of the artist we work with, and those we are yet to meet, thank you for your interest, your support, and your advocacy for us. We simply cannot do what we do without you.

I look forward to seeing what 2023 holds. More importantly, I look forward to seeing you at Metro Arts.

ARTISTIC DIRECTOR & CEO REPORT

Jo Thomas

2022 marks my eighth year leading Metro Arts and what a wild ride it has been. Over the past eight years the organisation has grown and grown up. Metro Arts is an important institution, a vital incubator of new work and a crucial contributor to culture locally and nationally. The successes of our programs and independent artists continue to amaze and inspire me.

Independent artists are the lifeblood of arts and culture in Australia. The Lifeblood. Life. Blood. Independent artists give strength, vitality, and life to the Australian arts sector.

They are indispensable, vital, crucial. Metro Arts does not fit in a box as an easily explained arts institution because we work with indispensable, independent contemporary artists. We focus on creating and presenting new multidisciplinary work but also extending artist career development and pathways. In 2022 some of our most impressive support for artists has been demonstrated in new pilot programs. One of these has been our MAVA Pathfinder program where three mid-career visual artists, Liz Willing, James Barth and Caitlin Franzmann, have been employed for 12 months, with studio space and professional development opportunities to extend their career opportunities and build sector capacity; and I thank UAP for joining us on this journey.

We were only able to do this work because we received federal RISE funds – an additional \$400,000 in funding – something an organisation like Metro Arts doesn't see often enough. We have also used those funds to further develop a workshop and studio spaces with a focus on the potential of art beyond gallery contexts. In 2022 and continuing into 2023 we have also partnered with Counterpilot as our Company in Residence. With additional project funding the core artists have been employed whilst being mentored and managed by Metro Arts as they create, premiere and tour. In 2022 this prolific collective of artists had two world premiere works with Metro Arts: the stunning ADRIFT and the digital part-improvised offering, Breaking. On a personal note I also had the fearful joy of performing in Breaking!

A lot of this work Metro Arts does is not visible but it's vital to developing a sustainable independent arts community which then enriches our cultural identity nationally. Metro Arts is an active catalyst for the development of new work while maintaining artists' creative independence. The cumulative effect of this work on the sector should not be under-estimated. It is Life. It is Blood.

In 2022 Metro Arts also continued to work tirelessly to adapt to the changing circumstances post-Covid and provide our audiences with high-quality, engaging and thought-provoking experiences. Despite the challenges we have continued to push boundaries, showcase new talents and create a diverse program representative of our community. 2022 boasted a program featuring a range of innovative works from diverse artists. As always there was so much incredible work and I've highlighted just a few below:

- The world premiere of Where We Meet by Dr Eve Klein and Taitu'uga Kitch Wesche: a part memoir and part musicalmanifesto exploring cultural connections between Malta and Samoa;
- The world premiere and subsequent touring of *Betwixt* by Pink Matter highlighting the talents of emerging leader in the street dance field, Wanida Serce;
- The second iteration of our truly fabulous Mad Dance Festival showcasing the depth of skill and experience in the local street dance community;
- Our partnership with Next Wave supporting The Revolution

will not be Aestheticised by Warraba Weatherall, a challenging and ambitious exhibition and Weatherall's second major solo exhibition with Metro Arts;

- Volume: Bodies of Knowledge: an ambitious new work considering the body as an archive and how embodied frequencies, cadences and densities guide movement through neo-colonial spaces. This exhibition featured new commissioned work by nine multidisciplinary First Nations, Black and global indigenous voices;
- Finally bringing to the stage in Brisbane Our Blood Runs in the Street by Shane Anthony. This powerful work, originally due to be shown at Metro Arts in 2020, presented an unapologetic look at how cultural prejudice and bias contributes to violence against gay and transgender people in Australia.
- Our Brisbane Festival partnership continued to be a highlight particularly with the new exhibition presented by Tara Pattenden, Eephus & Sudo's Funderdome; the world premiere of (now) multi-award-winning one-woman show Batshit by



Leah Shelton; and the international partnership with Rhum + Clay from the UK bringing us their phenomenal one-man show of *Mistero* Buffo by Dario Fo.

We are proud of our community engagement activities which continued in 2022 including artist roundtables, panel discussions and community nights. We continued to strengthen our ties with donors through targeted stewardships and relationship-building activities and thank all donors and philanthropists for their support. I've greatly enjoyed getting to know many of them better personally and welcoming them to our activities, shows and exhibitions.

Thank you to the hard-working Metro Arts Board, led by Fiona Hawthorne, the Metro Arts team, and the artists, who continue to share their energy, ideas, blood, sweat and tears with us all. I strive to continue to honour your commitment and support you and advocate for you in these ongoing challenging times.



TREASURY REPORT

Paul Bowker, Board Treasurer and Kim Hughes, **Acting Chair Investment Committee**

2022 was a year of transition for Metro Arts where the Business moved from a heavily COVID impacted operation back into almost-regular trading. The first six months saw a gradual rebuild, with some cancelled shows and lower ticket sales, but by the end of 2022 the Business was trading at full capacity.

As a Business, we are particularly proud of being able to keep most of our staff fully engaged throughout the COVID pandemic, as well as continuing to support our artistic community both financially, emotionally and through providing ongoing opportunities to perform and exhibit.

The organisation's committed support to community through 2022, including through the COVID impacted period in early 2022. had an impact on financial results. Our revenue from operations decreased from \$318,000 in 2021 to \$232,000 in 2022, as a result of COVID related disruptions early in the year. At the same time, our operating expenses increased as a result of returning to full staffing levels as well as the wind down of the JobKeeper benefits received in prior periods.

You will however note that the overall financial result delivered by the business for 2022 was a loss of \$1,617,000. Although impacted by a loss from the underlying operations, the biggest contributor was the loss through the Metro Arts Future Fund. The details are set out in the MAFF Report: however the loss was largely a result of the MAFF being invested into both growth and defensive domestic and international investments which had negative returns across the period in line with macro trends.

The Board continues to revise the MAFF investment strategy to ensure that the Fund delivers both returns to enable investment into the artistic community as well as ensuring any downside risk to the capital base of the fund is mitigated.

There has been a notable improvement in the operating performance of Metro in the back half of 2022 and the Board is confident that the team, led by Jo Thomas and her dedicated and talented staff, will continue to grow Metro into a robust business into the future.

On behalf of the Board, we would like to thank all those involved in ensuring Metro continues to play a valuable role in promoting the arts, including Jo and her Team, our wonderful artists and performers, the Members and supporters of Metro and importantly all the engaged attendees at our performances and exhibitions throughout the year.

Metro Arts Future Fund (MAFF)

In 2022, heighted and persistent inflation across the global economy led to increased volatility in financial asset valuations and increased cost pressures. As a result, in both the domestic and international investment markets to which the MAFF is exposed. there was significant turbulence and negative returns across most asset classes.

As at 1 January 2021, the MAFF Portfolio was valued at \$7,338,073, and the asset allocation was 61% to growth assets and 39% to defensive assets. Throughout the year, consistent with the strategic purpose of the MAFF, \$325,000 was distributed from the portfolio to assist Metro Arts in supporting Australian contemporary art and artists. As at 31 December 2022, the MAFF was valued at \$6,070,823 invested across a 60/40 growth vs defensive asset allocation. The reduction in the balance of the MAFF through the 12 months to 31 December was a combination of negative returns from the asset classes in which the MAFF was invested, as well as the ongoing distributions of income and assets from the MAFF into the arts community.

As we move forward into 2023, the Board is completing its indepth analysis of the MAFF with the aim to build resilience and downside protection, and ensure the MAFF is well positioned to capture upside and continue to grow its capital base and generate sufficient investment returns to support artists over the long-term.

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DEVELOPMENT REPORT

Genevieve Trace, General Manager and Linden Tierney, Head of Fundraising and Philanthropy

2022 was an opportunity for Metro Arts to review its unique giving proposition with the establishment of the Metro Arts Future Fund (MAFF) and create a strong annual planning framework for partnership delivery along with an ambitious philanthropic journey for current and prospective donors.

In February, Mrs Gina Fairfax AC and Mr Tim Fairfax AC and family were hosted at a special gathering of Metro Arts Board, staff and independent artists to directly connect with the outcome of their valuable investment into the MAFF. Sharing creative works in development were Dr Eve Klein and Taitu'uga Kitch Wesche from *Where We Meet*, a collaborative work combining opera and beat boxing, and Nathan Sibthorpe, Christine Felmingham and Mike Willmett from Counterpilot, our Company in Residence. Over the course of the year, Gina and Tim joined Metro Arts in seeing these works presented as part of the annual program. Gina and Tim are embedded treasures in arts philanthropy in Brisbane and Metro Arts cannot acknowledge enough the impact their generosity has on the organisation and the hundreds of artists we support annually.

A focused effort on extending Metro Arts' networks saw the Giving Committee welcome new members James Jarvis, Distribution Manager with Centuria, and Peter O'Sullivan, Chief People Officer at BDO. We welcomed new guests of Perpetual Private, the managers of the MAFF, to Playlab's Brutal Utopias in May. Many past Art Starter donors re-engaged as part of the EOFY campaign following the pandemic blip, and a significant pick up in ticket and bar purchase round-up donations was experienced as a result of strategic messaging. Finally, in December Metro Arts partnered with Mummy's Wish during the Bear With Me season to raise funds for this foundation supporting mums with cancer.

Throughout 2022 Metro Arts continued to identify funding opportunities to support key initiatives. We were successful in securing support through an Arts Queensland QASP grant to commission Brisbane artist, Paula Dunlop, to create a new permanent installation in Factory Lane at Metro Arts' home in the West Village precinct. A successful application to the Lord Mayor's Better Suburbs fund secured upgrades to our Norman Park site necessary as the location of the MAVA Pathfinders studio and community workshop space. The Emerging Producer Xchange (EPX) supported by the Ian Potter Foundation also concluded in 2022 after two years of strategic support in delivering a highly successful capacity building program.

Metro Arts welcomed the continued support of all its corporate partners throughout the year and we focused on re-establishing the delivery of agreed benefits after the interruptions of 2020 and 2021. The acknowledgement of Hutchinson Builders as Founding Venue Partner concluded however, the impact of their support during Metro Arts transition to its new home will be felt for many years to come. West Village continued its partnership with a renewed commitment in support of a new audio tour commission for the precinct. The year again saw Metro Arts partner with Mad Dance House on the presentation of Mad Dance Festival. We welcomed UAP (Urban Art Projects) as a new Industry Partner of the MAVA Pathfinders program and Specfurn Commercial Furniture as a partner for their fit out of Norman park. YomConnect joined Metro Arts in November as the new Media Partner for the organisation and our partnership with TAFE continued to deliver mutual benefits to staff and students. Finally, in late 2022, Metro Arts was accepted into the Brisbane Economic Development Agency's (BEDA) program to support the creation and delivery of bespoke cultural tourism experiences identified as a potential new development revenue stream for the organisation in 2023 and beyond.

As always, Metro Arts sincerely thanks all our funding stakeholders, donors and sponsors for their continued support and especially Arts Queensland, Australia Council for the Arts and Brisbane City Council, as the organisation rediscovers its joy, capacity and resource to support our independent contemporary artists and arts makers.




